Good rainy Sunday morning from a hill in Rockport!

We need the rain.... Don't let it dampen your thanksgiving that we are invited to share on this important day of remembering our beginnings in America in 1776!

I remember another day of independence celebration. I was standing on a street corner with three American colleagues in Novorossiysk in the south of Russia in late July, 1994. We were witnessing the celebration of "Liberation Day" which commemorates the day that Novorossiysk was liberated at the end of World War II. We observed troops of Russian soldiers march by in serious style and formation. We watched Russian children stand in line to lay bouquets of flowers on Russian statues commemorating this important day for the people of Novorossiysk. We heard Russians singing songs of celebration about the day of liberation from their enemies in World War II. I remember saying to my three colleagues, "Did you ever think we would be standing on a Russian sidewalk watching Russian troops march by, observing Russian children lay wreaths on statues, and hearing Russian citizens sing songs of freedom and joy?" "No," my colleagues responded. And I am sorry to say, I've never witnessed such respect, honor and reverence paid to Independence Day in our country. This saddens me very much each year as I remember that scene of me and my three American friends watching Russians remember their history so sincerely and so passionately....

For the Lord your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great God, mighty and awesome, who is not partial and takes no bride, who executes justice for the orphan and the widow, and who loves the strangers, providing them food and clothing. You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. You shall fear the Lord your God; him alone you shall worship; to him you shall hold fast, and by his name you shall swear. He is your praise; he is your God, who has done for you these great and awesome things that your own eyes have seen.

Deuteronomy 10:17-21

Will you pray with me. God of the oldest and the newest teachings of faith, give us discerning minds and open hearts this fourth of July. Teach us how to interpret your Word that we might learn to distinguish between true prophets of your will in our sacred history, and in our current life, and those who are not. Amen.

Today is Independence Day in America. Tomorrow, July 5<sup>th</sup>, will be the day that Americans are given a "day off" from work in recognition of the significance of the day we remember each year as the birthday of our country. Tomorrow is a Federal holiday in America.

Each year I think of July 4<sup>th</sup>, Independence Day, as a wake up call. (put bell on pulpit and sound it!)

It's the day we remember the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1776, or thereabouts, when the Second Continental Congress adopted the

Declaration and the birth of the United States of America as an independent nation! (sound bell)

It's the day we remember to sing patriotic songs as we are this morning, acknowledging the struggles, the contributions, and the sacrifices of our forefathers, and foremothers! (sound bell)

It's the day we remember how to make that great potato salad and coleslaw that our mothers and grandmothers used to make for us! (sound bell)

And it's the day we remember, more than any other day of the year, that we are one nation, under God, indivisible and with liberty and justice for all! (sound bell)

And it's the day we remember, or should remember, that not all in our country feel that sense of liberty and justice as much as some of us do. (silence bell)

Have you read the entire Declaration of Independence? I hadn't, I'm embarrassed to say, until last night. But we know the most famous words from the Preamble of this life changing document: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men (I so wish it had said "all people") are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness...." (sound bell) The Declaration of Independence "expresses the ideals on which the United States was founded and the reasons for separation from Great Britain." (source: <a href="archives.gov">archives.gov</a>)

It's the ideals that hold us together, and it's the ideals that too often separate us. How do we ever come together as a nation of independent states sharing the same ideals, the same self-evident truths, the same unalienable rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness? What do you think? Why can't we all be on the same page on this July 4<sup>th</sup>, Independence Day? (get responses)

I don't have a good answer to the question of why we can't seem to agree on our country's ideals. But I have a suggestion: read the Book of Deuteronomy from the Hebrew Scriptures, the Old Testament to Christians. Deuteronomy was most likely written around 1,400 BC, that's about 1,400 years before Jesus was born. It's old. (sound bell)

"Deuteronomy is a sermon – actually a series of sermons. It is the longest sermon in the Bible and maybe the longest sermon ever. Deuteronomy presents Moses, standing on the plains of Moab with all Israel assembled before him, preaching. It is his last sermon. When he completes it, he will leave his pulpit on the plains, climb a mountain and die." I do hope I don't die as soon as I've

delivered my last sermon! This sermon, to give you a heads up, will be one of my shortest, not one of my longest!

Our brief text for today from Chapter 10 of Deuteronomy highlights "the great God, mighty and awesome, who is not partial and takes no bribe, who executes justice for the orphan and the widow, and who loves the strangers, providing them food and clothing. You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." (Deuteronomy 10:17-19)

July 4<sup>th</sup> is the day each year that I try to remember most of us were strangers in this land of ours at one time or another, if not through our immediate relatives, then through our distant ones. My oldest known ancestor's name was Elizabeth Stonestreet and she lived in West Virginia from the late 1700's to the early 1800's. Before then her ancestors probably came from Germany or England.

We're all strangers here, recent immigrants or distant relatives of immigrants, unless Native American blood courses through our veins in greater or lesser amounts. If only we tried harder, couldn't we somehow find the thread of the American ideal of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness that could bring us all together in a giant quilt of fellowship and citizenship? (sound bell)

July 4<sup>th</sup>, Independence Day, is wake-up call day! (sound bell) Let us wake up, sing, give thanks, and share in Holy Communion with all who choose to partake this day. Let the people say, "Amen.
